NOMINEE STATEMENTS

Describe your leadership experience both within CUR and extramural.

I have mentored 81 undergraduate and high school research students during the 30 years I have been a faculty member. These students have been co-authors of many articles as well as campus, regional, national, and international conference presentations. Beyond my own student-faculty engagement, I have been a change-maker for undergraduate research at my institution. In 2003, I organized an ad hoc taskforce to increase campus-wide undergraduate research, scholarship, and creative activities (URSCA). This group started the conversation about increasing recognition and engagement in this practice. In 2007 and 2008, I led two teams of colleagues (faculty, staff, and administrators) to a pair of CUR workshops on institutionalizing and sustaining a campus-wide URSCA structure. These efforts launched the Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarship, and I served as Director for nine years. During that period, I guided the development of the office's first two strategic plans and implemented their goals. As the Director, our Advancement team and I successfully generated the first endowment to support the URSCA program. More recently as department chair, we communicated the value of URSCA to a donor who gave a significant gift to support this work in chemistry.

To expand URSCA opportunities to all chemistry-interested students, I have implemented a course-based undergraduate research experience (CURE) in my intermediate-level course. I have shared this model widely via national meeting symposia and a book chapter. Additionally, as the director of our office, I actively collaborated with numerous colleagues across campus to grow a research-rich culture that invites all students to join the conversation and experiences.

How will your skills help the Council successfully uphold its charge?

Attendance at Posters on the Hill and several CUR workshops allowed me to see the importance of the organization. Consequently, I stood for election as a Councilor in 2007 and maintained that role until 2020. I served in a variety of leadership roles as a representative. I was the Vice-Chair of the division from 2017 until 2020. I was a member of the division nominations committee for seven years and served as its chair for four years. Moreover, I was the chair of the CUR nominations committee for two years, one of which resulted in my selection as Volunteer of the Year (2015). Additionally, I was the chair of a CUR-wide Membership Engagement Taskforce for two years and a divisional Chemistry Advocacy Group for three years. Lastly, I served CUR beyond the organization as a facilitator at multiple workshops and as a department reviewer. In the new Councilor role, I plan to apply the knowledge from these experiences and build new bridges among the divisions in ways that help achieve the organization's strategic goals.

I look forward to working with my division representatives as we seek innovative ways to engage our membership and possible new members. Additionally, I am excited to share divisional ideas and goals with the Council and the Board and Executive Committee.
